Feeding Connection Learning from Country

ART AND STORYTELLING AS A PATHWAY TO RECONCILIATION

For over 15 years students have been creating art and writing that celebrates Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people's cultures, histories, languages, stories and the call for all Australians to participate in reconciliation. The Schools Reconciliation Challenge is a free annual art and writing program open to all NSW and ACT primary and secondary students in stages 2-5. Teachers and students are encouraged to use the curriculum-based resources online to inspire, learn and create a culturally inclusive classroom. Each year we explore a different theme, in 2025 the theme is Feeding Connection: Learning from Country.

Artworks and writing are showcased in a variety of locations including International Towers at Barangaroo, the Foyer of The Rocks Discovery Museum and NSW Parliament House in Sydney. The exhibition also travels to regional locations throughout NSW supported by the National Trust.

FREE RESOURCES FOR THE CLASSROOM

Both the Schools Reconciliation Challenge and the Reconciliation NSW website offer online resources to support teachers and educators learn about a range of subjects.

Students are encouraged to express themselves and to engage in practical exercises such as participating in talking/yarning circles, reading and evaluating stories and articles, understanding truth telling and race-relations, as well as practicing their art and writing skills. This year we have a special lesson plan developed wit Australians Together, that you will receive for free upon your registration.

Feeding Connection : Learning from Country

is a celebration of deep knowledge, cultural resilience, and ecological care. At its core is the understanding that Country is a living entity - one that teaches, nourishes, and connects us all. This project invites students to explore how food and farming are cultural practices, rich with stories, identity, and wisdom.

First Nations peoples have cared for Country for tens of thousands of years through regenerative agricultural systems that align with natural rhythms. Practices like native grain cultivation, cultural burning, and land stewardship support biodiversity and climate resilience. These traditions show us that sustainability is not new - it's long been central to Indigenous ways of being.

Growing food becomes a metaphor for planting seeds of change. Students are invited to reflect on their relationship with land, culture, and each other. They explore how food connects us to the past, sustains the present, and shapes a just, sustainable future.

Grounded in visual storytelling and thoughtful design, this project encourages curiosity and connection. Reconciliation is not a single act, but an ongoing commitment - rooted in listening, learning, and acting with care.

Each year, the Schools Reconciliation Challenge offers free online workshops in partnership with leading cultural and education organisations, including the Department of Education's Arts Unit, the Powerhouse Museum, Red Room Poetry, and Sydney Story Factory. These workshops explore both contemporary and traditional perspectives on First Nations cultures, languages, art, and technology - sparking student creativity in writing and visual art.
